## Inquiring Minds Want to Know...Where exactly do the Rector's come from?

As a secretariat, we are often asked by those within the community exactly how the Rector for each weekend is chosen.

## Contrary to popular belief...one does not have to be on the Secretariat in order to serve as a Rector neither does one have to go to a specific church.

The initial procedure for Rector selection begins about a year in advance, when the Men's and Women's leaders present the Secretariat with a list of names and qualifications of all those who meet the requirements to be chosen for Rector. The process of Rector selection takes place within phases and is covered with a lot of prayer from the Secretariat.

The Rector needs to have served within the community at least ten weekends including as Head or Assistant Head Cha, in 2 different Head positions, as Professor giving two rollos, Chapel Cha, Kitchen Cha and three additional Cha Cha positions such as music, table, supply, rollo room, dorm, palanca, rover, gopher, nightwatch, etc...

In addition to meeting the "Service" requirements, the Secretariat looks at a list of other questions in order to narrow their decision even further. Is the candidate for Rector active in his or her church? Do they support their church? Is the candidate for Rector currently involved in Tres Dias activities? Does the candidate for Rector support Tres Dias in their 4th Day – ie: Sequelas, serving on weekends, send-off, send-off communion, closings, sponsoring? Is the candidate for Rector currently living a Christian life that exemplifies Christ in his or her 4th Day? Has the candidate for Rector shown willingness to submit

to authority on the weekends when serving or during attendance of sponsored activities? Has the candidate for Rector shown a willingness to submit to the authority of the Secretariat? Does the candidate for Rector understand Tres Dias goals and purposes? Does the candidate for Rector set an example of proper conduct – ie: attend pre- weekend activities including Pescadores Orientation, pre-weekend meetings, and stay through completion of team and weekend activities? Does the candidate for Rector have a servant's heart? Does the candidate for Rector demonstrate good leadership skills? Has the candidate for Rector served within the past 6 weekends?

The qualifications of each candidate for Rector is discussed in great length at the Secretariat meeting prior to any voting. Time is spent in prayer, and voting is done by secret ballot. The votes are collected and counted by the Chair and Spiritual Director.

The Chair contacts the potential rectors and once a Rector has accepted the position, the Chair will notify the Secretariat, and subsequently the Rector will be announced to the community.
